1. Community Rewilding at Allestree Park with Derby City Council and Derbyshire Wildlife Trust

A site visit to find out how a local authority partnered with a wildlife trust to manage a park in a different way and realise its potential for both wildlife and people. Rewilding Allestree Park is a partnership between Derbyshire Wildlife Trust, Derby City Council and the University of Derby and is the largest urban rewilding project in the UK. It will see vital habitats connected throughout the city.

Wildlife will flourish and species will return, the people of Derby and surrounding areas will have an even more beautiful, wild, and natural space to visit, and the nature-rich park will store more carbon and other emissions - directly helping with the climate and nature crisis.

2. Eastern Moors Partnership with Danny Udall & Team, Barbrook Cottages

For the last 13 years a site-based countryside team of staff and volunteers (an NT & RSPB partnership) have been carefully restoring an area of degraded moorland on the edge of the Peak District NP into a conservation, access and upland farming success. Degraded and sheep wrecked peat bogs have slowly been restored to active habitats, new woodland and carefully managed extensive grazing by cattle and deer. The partnership team have taken people with them on this quiet restoration journey that champions natural solutions and uses sound evidence-based decision making from their years of impressive conservation monitoring data.

3. Companion FiPL projects at Whitle and nature recovery on the Warslow Estate

With Jess Coatesworth, Ranger Team Leader, Peak District National Park Authority

A visit to two different sites in the Peak District National Park to see how the authority is supporting landowners towards nature recovery both on the National Park Authority's properties and also via the Farming in Protected Landscape scheme (FiPL).

AM - Visit neighbouring farms in the beautiful Dove Valley that are all involved in nature recovery through FiPL. Here FiPL has funded work to maintain unimproved grassland, create scrapes, restore ponds, and protect river quality, all for the benefit of wildlife and to improve habitat. Permissive paths and interpretation have also been created as part of the scheme. One of the FiPL advisors will join us to discuss how the projects were developed in close partnership with the landowners. Depending on the weather, it may also be a good opportunity to view some rare waxcaps.

PM - Visit PDNPA's Warslow Estate, with the Estate Ranger, where we will look at some of the work that has been undertaken to improve the status of this Special Protection Area and Special Area of Conservation. There will also be the opportunity to see some of the conservation work on field barns undertaken as part of the Southwest Peak Partnership Project, which finished in 2022.

4. Dovedale National Nature Reserve – A walk from the YHA

(With Andy Gibb and NT Ranger staff)

Rewilding the river where Izaak Walton wrote the "Compleat Angler" and managing Ash dieback in a limestone ravine environment. A good walk up the dale to low and high points discussing the removal of weirs in the river to re-naturalise it for wild trout (partnership with the Wild Trout Trust) and using Ash dieback as an opportunity to restructure the ravine woodland – utilizing an EU LIFE grant.
